Star Power: Edward Steichen's Glamour Photography

In 2007, I traded the Brooklyn Bridge for its prototype, the Roebling, and came back

to Ĉincinnati after 30 years in New York. But I'm a real Midwesterner. I was born downriver in Madison, got a Bachelor of

But Cincinnati kept calling me back. In 1985, I curated Transparent Motives: Glass on a Large Scale for the CAC. In 1993, I organized Tell Me a Story: Narrative Art in Clay and Glass for the U.S. Information Agency. It traveled to Asia, but debuted at the Taft Museum of Art.

And now I'm back with a view of the Roebling, writing about the visual arts.

In October "photomania" grips Cincinnati and beyond with FOTOFOCUS, a month-long celebration of what co-chair James Crump, chief curator of the Cincinnati Art Museum, calls "the medium of our time."

FOTOFOCUS features 70+ exhibitions plus opening receptions, performances, lectures, book signings, gallery talks, walking tours, bus trips, films, and a collectors' weekend. Crump calls it a

"chockablock" schedule. For 20 years, businessman, photographer and arts patron Thomas Schiff had harbored the dream of a collaborative effort by area arts organizations centered around photography.

It began to take form in May 2010, when the organizing committee, co-chaired by Crump and Raphaela Platow, director and chief curator, Contemporary Arts Center, met for the first time with leaders of local arts organizations. "They were curious and enthusiastic," says Crump.


